

VISION:

To build a globally respected, environmentally responsible, and economically empowering oil and gas sector that guarantees Guyana's sovereignty, ensures maximum returns for the people, and protects our environment, economy, and future generations.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES:

- **1. Sovereignty:** Guyana must control and benefit from its resources.
- **2. Transparency:** Full disclosure of all agreements, revenue flows, environmental plans, and approvals.
- **3. Accountability:** Industry operators must comply with all laws, best practices, and face consequences for violations.
- **4. Sustainability:** Prioritize environmental protection, local capacity building, and long-term national planning.
- **5. Equity:** Ensure that every Guyanese benefits.

STRATEGIC POLICY OBJECTIVES AND ACTIONS

- 1. Renegotiate the Stabroek Block and Other Contracts
- Within 30 days of assuming office, initiate renegotiation of the Stabroek Block

- Production Sharing Agreement (PSA), including transitioning to a new model that ensures Guyana receives its fair and proportional share of oil revenues.
- Introduce ring-fencing provisions to ensure cost recovery is limited to each project, guaranteeing faster revenue flows to Guyana.

2. Create a Strong, Independent Regulatory Framework

- Within 60 days, establish a National Petroleum Commission (NPC) as an independent, professional body to regulate exploration, production, and compliance.
- Ensure the NPC is staffed with qualified professionals, insulated from political influence, and mandated to oversee contracts, compliance, safety, and environmental protection.

3. End Harmful Environmental Practices

- Reinstate the prohibition on routine gas flaring which releases over 200 pollutants.
- Banthedischarge of toxic, hot, chemicallylaced produced water into the ocean.
- Enforce all safe operating limits as outlined in Environmental Impact Assessments (EIA).

4. Enforce Full Environmental and Spill Liability Coverage

- Uphold Justice Kissoon's ruling: Oil companies and all affiliates must have full liability coverage for oil spills.
- Require continuous financial proof of insurance or bonds from operators to cover potential catastrophic incidents.
- Impose mandatory 24/7 monitoring and emergency response capability.

5. Build Capacity at Oversight Agencies

- Rebuild the specialized Petroleum Oversight Unit at the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
- Reinstate World Bank-supported capacity-building initiatives for EPA, GRA, and other regulatory bodies.
- Train and retain petroleum professionals to ensure on-site oversight of all offshore operations.

6. Implement Comprehensive Waste Management

- Re-establish a cradle-to-grave hazardous waste management system.
- Construct state-of-the-art landfills to safely handle toxic, radioactive, and chemical waste.
- Introduce strong monitoring and auditing mechanisms for waste handling



and disposal.

7. Strengthen the Natural Resource Fund (NRF)

- Reform the NRF to guarantee independence, technical competence, public participation, and equitable distribution.
- Publish quarterly reports on revenues, expenditures, and investment



- performance.
- Require parliamentary and civil society oversight of fund withdrawals and investments.

8. Ensure Total Transparency and Public Access to Information

- Mandate publication of all contracts, permits, licenses, agreements, EIAs, and feasibility studies within seven days of approval.
- Develop a publicly accessible digital portal for all industry-related documents.
- Institute a culture of open government in the extractive sector.

9. Demand World-Class Standards for Project Evaluation

- Require rigorous feasibility studies and independent Environmental and Social Impact Assessments (ESIAs) before approval of major oil and gas projects.
- Insist on detailed project management plans, performance benchmarks, and regular audits.
- Engage global experts to vet mega projects prior to implementation.

10. International Partnerships and Legal Protections

 Strengthen legal safeguards against exploitative contracts and corporate abuses.

- Sign cooperative agreements with international oversight bodies like the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI).
- Maintain robust legal representation to defend Guyana's interests in arbitration and disputes.

Emergency Response and Oil Spill Readiness

- Require all operators to maintain full oil spill contingency plans reviewed biannually.
- Stockpile oil spill response equipment in strategic coastal and offshore zones.
- Conduct quarterly simulations and emergency drills with EPA, Civil Defence Commission, and international partners.
- Impose strict penalties for delayed or negligent responses.

CONCLUSION:

Guyana's Oil Must Work for All Guyanese

Guyana's oil boom presents a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. But without clear policies, strong institutions, environmental safeguards, and people-centred leadership, it can become a burden.
