EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

early half of Guyana's population is under 30, with youth aged 15–29 representing approximately 22.3% in 2024. The AFC envisions a Guyana where young people are empowered to become full participants in national life. This integrated strategytransforms young people into active agents of development—empowering them with access to housing, education, innovation, health, and participation in governance.

By prioritizing youth today, Guyana invests in inclusion, resilience, and sustainable growth. **The future is youth-led—and it starts now.**

1. Affordable Housing Access for Youth

Objective: Empower young people to own homes and start independent adult lives.

Policy Measures:

- Every youth at 18 years will receive a FREE HOUSE LOT.
- Establish a Youth Housing Scheme with mortgage ownership options and subsidized mortgages.

- Reserve a percentage of government housing allocations for low-income and first-time young homeowners.
- Implementation:
- Partner with CH&PA and commercial banks to develop **youth-focused mortgage packages**.
- Launch a Youth Housing Fair to connect youth with housing providers and financing.

2. National Broadband and Connectivity Program

Objective: Bridge the digital divide and enable access to education, work, and innovation.

Policy Measures:

- Expand broadband in rural and hinterland areas with learning hubs and mobile digital classrooms.
- Upgrade community ICT centres with high-speed Wi-Fi and devices.
- · Implementation:
- Strengthen partnerships with telecoms (WiFiGY, E-Networks).



 Equip all secondary schools with Wi-Fi, ICT labs, and free student data packages.

3. Investment in Arts, Culture, Sports, and Creative Industries

Objective: Foster holistic youth development through creative expression and physical activity.

Policy Measures:

- Develop Municipal Youth Arts and Sports Centres in all ten regions.
- Establish National Youth Orchestras,
 Dance Troupes, and Drama Companies.
- Invest in community studios for film, music, fine arts, and fashion.
- Protect creative works via enhanced copyright legislation.

Implementation:

Collaborate with the Ministry of Culture, UNESCO, and private sponsors.

Enact a Youth Creative Rights Bill.

4. National Youth Wellness & Mental Health Clinics

Objective: Improve youth access to mental, sexual, and reproductive health services.

Policy Measures:

- Establish **youth-friendly wellness centres** in each region.
- Recruit and train mental health professionals focused on youth.
- Run public awareness campaigns to reduce stigma.
- · Implementation:
- Integrate with Ministry of Health regional services.
- Collaborate with UNFPA and PAHO for clinic design and training.
- **5. Education, Scholarships, and Training Objective:** Equip youth with knowledge and skills for a modern economy.

Policy Measures:

Provide full scholarships for local and

- international studies.
- Expand technical and vocational training via GSA, NATI, and GITC.
- Integrate TVET into secondary school curricula with career pathways.
- · Implementation:
- · Create a Scholarship Oversight Board.
- Partner with UNESCO and CARICOM for regional exchanges.

6. Mentorship, Dropout Prevention & School Retention

Objective: Support vulnerable and at-risk youth to complete their education.

Policy Measures:

- Launch a National Youth Mentorship Network.
- Expand after-school programmes focused on life skills, tutoring, and psychosocial support.
- · Implementation:
- Recruit trained mentors via NGOs, faith groups, and civil society.
- Use Ministry of Education data to track and address dropouts.
- **7. Justice, Protection, and Fair Treatment Objective:** Ensure youth are treated fairly, safely, and with dignity.

Policy Measures:

- Implement the **Juvenile Justice Act** with restorative practices.
- Establish youth courts and expand legal aid access.
- Train police and justice officials in youthsensitive engagement.
- Implementation:
- Partner with UNICEF and Ministry of Legal Affairs.
- Publish annual youth justice performance reports.

8. Youth Engagement in Governance and Leadership

Objective: Institutionalize youth voices in national decision-making.



Policy Measures:

- Expand the President's Youth Advisory Council (PYAC) to include regional and Indigenous youth.
- Mandate youth quotas in local councils, boards, and committees.
- Launch a paid Youth Fellowship Programme in government ministries.
- Implementation:
- Amend the Local Government Act to include youth quotas.
- Host an Annual Youth Parliament.

9. Youth Entrepreneurship and Innovation Objective: Support young entrepreneurs and innovators.

Policy Measures:

- Establish Youth Innovation Hubs in ICT, agri-tech, and creative sectors.
- Launch a Youth Entrepreneur Fund with grants and mentorship.
- Provide access to land, training, and markets for youth in agriculture.
- · Implementation:
- Coordinate with Ministry of Business, Go-Invest, DFIs.
- · Linkdiaspora mentors to youth incubators via virtual exchanges.

10. Monitoring, Coordination, and Evaluation

Objective: Ensure accountability and relevance of youth policy.

Policy Measures:

- Create a National Youth Development Council with cross-sector oversight.
- Maintain open youth data dashboards (employment, education, health).
- Review and revise youth policy every five years.
- · Implementation:
- · Appoint a **Ministerial Youth Champion**.
- Partner with UNDP and ILO for technical support.

11. Support for Sustainable Agriculture Objective: Empower youth to engage in

sustainable agriculture for food security and income.

Policy Measures:

a. Access to Land and Resources

- Launch a Youth Agricultural Land Grant Programme for ages 18–35.
- Provide youth access to state and underutilized farmland.

b. Education and Training

- Introduce modern agriculture and agribusiness into schools.
- Provide scholarships, internships, and apprenticeships in agri-tech.

c. Start-Up Support

- Create a Youth Agro-Enterprise Fund for grants and loans.
- Support equipment leasing and input subsidies.
- · d. Innovation in Agriculture
- Promote use of drones, hydroponics, and precision tools.
- · Develop **agriculture apps** for youth.

e. Market Access

- Establish youth-specific markets and digital selling platforms.
- Provide branding and export-readiness support.

f. Environmental Sustainability

- Train youth in eco-friendly farming, composting, and agroforestry.
- Align with Low Carbon Development Strategy (LCDS).

Implementation:

- Lead Agencies: Ministries of Agriculture, Youth, Education, Go-Invest.
- Monitor progress via annual youth advisory reviews.
- Partner with NGOs, private sector, and international donors.

12. Inclusion of Youths in National Decision-Making

Objective: Institutionalize youth voices in all levels of government and policy-making.

Policy Measures:

a. Representation

Mandate youth participation (ages 18–35)



- on all national boards and committees.
- Create a National Youth Advisory Council under the President.

b. Legislative Advocacy

- Advocate for constitutional reform to recognize youth as key stakeholders.
- Table a Youth Participation Act to formalize their roles in policymaking.

c. Civic and Leadership Training

- Introduce civic education and leadership development in schools and youth organizations.
- Provide **fellowships and workshops** for public service preparation.

d. Digital Engagement

- · Develop an e-Governance Youth Portal.
- Promote **national youth polls** to inform government decisions.
- e. Support Youth-Led Initiatives

- Increase funding and technical assistance for youth NGOs.
- Encourage **co-creation of policies** with youth groups.

Implementation: Short Term (1–2 Years):

- · Establish Youth Advisory Council;
- · Launch civic education;
- Begin consultations for the Youth Participation Act.

Medium Term (3-5 Years):

- · Enact the Youth Participation Act;
- · Institutionalize consultation mechanisms:
- · Expand digital platforms.
- · Long Term (5+ Years):
- Mainstream youth participation across government;
- Track progress via Youth Inclusion Scorecard.
